3. PROJECT SUMMARY AND PURPOSE

Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPIs) have the largest income inequality of any other racial or ethnic subgroup in the United States. The top 10 percent of earners make more than 10 times what the bottom 10 percent of the community does. Further, low income AAPI communities are disproportionately concentrated in neighborhoods with high cost housing markets and the most rapidly increasing housing costs – placing our community at a higher risk of displacement and making homeownership an ever more elusive dream. As such, ensuring access to culturally and linguistically appropriate services and programs is essential to building economic opportunity for LMI AAPIs.

This *Economic Empowerment in AAPI Communities 2020* Request for Proposals invites community based organizations to submit applications for funding to support programs that serve low-income AAPIs under one of the following <u>CATEGORIES</u>:

- Financial Capability: Programs that offer culturally and linguistically appropriate financial coaching, assists consumers build capacity to manage financial resources effectively, builds financial knowledge and skills, and increases access to financial products so that consumers may improve their financial security and access economic opportunities. Housing counseling groups should not apply under this category.
- Housing Counseling Only: Programs that offer culturally and linguistically appropriate counseling to
 consumers on seeking, financing, maintaining, renting, or owning a home, as well as preventing
 homelessness or displacement. Counseling is provided by Local Housing Counseling Agencies (LHCA),
 subgrantees of National CAPACD, or agencies currently working towards participating in the HUD
 Housing Counseling Program, either as a LHCA or subgrantee of National CAPACD.
- Housing Counseling + Financial Capability Combined: Programs that offer both housing counseling and financial capability activities, as described in the bullets above.
- Empowerment Economics: A model co-founded by National CAPACD that integrates traditional financial capability with community agency to adapt financial systems to meet the needs of communities of color so that people work together to create the communities they want to live in. Applicants for this category must have attended an Empowerment Economics Summit.

Activities supported by this grant funding should support clients to achieve asset building outcomes such as: acquiring an asset (e.g. - purchase a home); improving understanding of and access to financial products and services; reducing debt; increasing savings; or improving or establishing credit.

The applicant must submit either a **performance-based** application or a **program capacity building** application. The purpose of these two <u>TYPES</u> of funding is to support organizations that have established themselves as leaders in the asset building field, as well as those that seek to grow or bolster their programming in this area. These two funding types have different scoring criteria, and required activities, detailed as follows.

- Performance-based sub-grants fund organizations that have a proven track record or have developed
 the organizational capacity to offer effective and quality services to a high client volume, or other
 significant deliverables outlined by National CAPACD or National CAPACD's donors.
- **Program capacity building sub-grants** fund organizations that aspire to build, or re-establish, capacity toward offering effective and quality services or programs. This category may include support for pilot projects, as dictated by National CAPACD or National CAPACD's donors.

This RFP combines National CAPACD's available funding through *private* philanthropic sources and does not include HUD Comprehensive Housing Counseling funding. These sub-grants are made possible with generous support from Bank of America, Capital One Foundation, Freddie Mac, JPMorgan Chase Foundation and Wells Fargo Foundation.

4. GRANT PERIOD

Awards will have a grant period of January 1, 2020 – December 31, 2020.

5. GRANT AWARD DETAILS

- A total of \$375,000 is available to support up to 15 grants total for all categories and types.
- Program Capacity building awards will be a maximum of \$20,000.
- Performance based awards will be a maximum of \$30,000.
- Awardees will also receive travel stipends to attend all required events (e.g. orientation, trainings). Scholarships may be available to attend additional professional development opportunities as appropriate.
- Final client delivery expectations will be negotiated upon contracting.

Other required activities for all sub-grants include:

- Attendance in required trainings (e.g. orientations, certifications, other professional development)
- Utilize client management systems and tools for tracking client progress and program outcomes
- Administer and collect client surveys to measure programmatic outcomes
- Submit quarterly progress reports and a final report, including client stories and financial reports
- Work closely with National CAPACD to document and disseminate program findings (if appropriate) with local media, asset building practitioners, federal agencies and elected officials



7. ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

- This RFP is only open to current sub-grantees. The applicant must have been supported by National CAPACD for activities conducted in 2019 through one of the following sub-grant programs: Economic Empowerment in AAPI Communities 2019, HUD Comprehensive Housing Counseling, ACTION TA, Multigenerational Approaches Research and Pilot.
- Applicants are not required to be a member of National CAPACD to respond to Requests for Proposals but are highly encouraged to become member organizations.
- Please refer to National CAPACD's Grant Guidelines PDF under section "General Eligibility Criteria" to see if your organization is able to apply for a grant.
